Judicial Council Memorandum No. 1495

April 22, 2024

IN RE: Petition for Declaratory Decision from the Council of Bishops on the Meaning, Application, and Effect of ¶¶ 55 and 2602.1 of the 2016 Book of Discipline.

Statement of Facts

On April 10, 2024, the Council of Bishops submitted to the Judicial Council a Petition for Declaratory Decision with the following questions:

(a) Does the sentence "A member's term of office shall be eight years" in ¶ 2602.1 mean that a person elected to the Judicial Council at the 2016 General Conference has served one eight-year term and must stand for re-election at the 2020 General Conference to be held in 2024 if the person desires to continue to serve on the Judicial Council?

(b) Does ¶ 55 of the Discipline give the General Conference authority to enact legislation to modify ¶ 2602.1 and determine whether a person elected to the Judicial Council at the 2016 General Conference has served one eight-year term and must stand for re-election at the 2020 General Conference to be held in 2024?

Digest

The Judicial Council declines jurisdiction. The Constitution provides in ¶ 55: "There shall be a Judicial Council. The **General Conference** shall determine the number and qualifications of its members, their terms of office, and the method of election and the filling of vacancies." [emphasis added]

Judicial Council Decision No. 1496

April 22, 2024

IN RE: Petition for Declaratory Decision Regarding Paragraph 710.4 of the 2016 Book of Discipline.

Digest

If they are nominated and elected at the postponed 2020 General Conference being held in 2024, the members of general agencies who were first elected to a four-year term at the 2016 General Conference may be elected to serve a second four-year term.

Statement of Facts

The question put to the Judicial Council by the Council of Bishops in its Petition for a Declaratory

Decision asks: Does ¶ 710.4 permit a voting member of a general agency elected at the 2016 General Conference to be elected to serve a second quadrennium beginning at the close of the 2020 General Conference to be held in 2024?

Jurisdiction

The Judicial Council has jurisdiction in this case pursuant to ¶ 2010.2b.

Analysis and Rationale

The law of the Church provides the answer to the question put to the Judicial Council. The voting members in question can serve no more than two consecutive four-year terms, the first of which began at the first meeting of their agency following the 2016 Portland General Conference.

These members are still serving their first four-year term (even though it has lasted for eight years) because since that first meeting there has not been a subsequent General Conference and no one has been nominated, elected and installed to take their place. If they are nominated and elected to another term at the postponed 2020 General Conference being held in 2024, they will start their second four-year term provided for in ¶ 710.4 at the first meeting of the general agency following the postponed 2020 General Conference in Charlotte

Decision

If they are nominated and elected at the postponed 2020 General Conference being held in 2024, the members of general agencies who were first elected to a four-year term at the 2016 General Conference may be elected to serve a second four-year term.

Dissenting Opinion

This Petition for a Declaratory Decision essentially requests whether, under ¶ 710.4, a voting member of a general agency that was elected during the 2016 General Conference is eligible for re-election at this General Conference.

This question does not present any issues of constitutionality but rather is a legislative determination that ought to be made by the General Conference. See, e.g., the holding in JCD 1310. See also JCD 1303.

The Discipline provides in \P 2608.2 that:

The council may decline to entertain an appeal or a petition for a declaratory decision in any instance in which it determines that it does not have jurisdiction to decide the matter.

The Judicial Council ought to have declined jurisdiction just as it has done in Memorandum 1495 concerning the term of office for Judicial Council members. These are matters to be

determined by the denomination's legislative body, the General Conference, which will be assembled in less than 24 hours. The *Constitution* sets forth the following:

- ¶ 16. Article IV.—The General Conference shall have full legislative power over all matters distinctively connectional, and in the exercise of this power shall have authority as follows:
- 4. To provide for the <u>organization</u>, promotion, and <u>administration</u> of the work of the Church outside the United States of America [Committee on Central Conference]
- 8. To initiate and to direct all connectional enterprises of the Church and to <u>provide boards</u> for their promotion and administration.
- 13. To <u>establish</u> such commissions for the general work of the Church as may be deemed advisable.
- 14. To secure the rights and privileges of membership in all agencies, programs, and institutions in The United Methodist Church regardless of race, gender, or status.

[emphasis added]

The Judicial Council must always be careful and avoid doing that which would usurp the authority of the General Conference. Similarly, the Council of Bishops can aid in this regard by avoiding the temptation to make requests for declaratory decisions when there are no constitutional issues and General Conference is soon to be convened. By declaring that the eight-year period [2016-2024] constitutes one four-year quadrennium is, in my opinion, legislating. This violates and undermines the *constitutional* authority that is vested solely and exclusively in the General Conference.

Of great concern is the language that is used in these Petitions for Declaratory Decisions. There are multiple times when the phrase *Postponed* 2020 General Conference to be held in 2024 appears in the Petition. Judicial Council decision 1451 used that phrase in dealing with the

issue of the persons who would serve as delegates to this 2024 General Conference. As opposed to the issue of persons who have been serving on general boards and agencies since 2016, the persons who were elected to serve as delegates to the 2020 General Conference have not yet served in that capacity. In any event, Decisions 1451 and 1472 were modified and clarified by Memorandum 1485 wherein the Judicial Council specifically ruled that this General Conference is the 2024 regular session of General Conference and also held that the next regular session that following the 2024 regular session will be the 2028 General Conference. In three separate instances, the Judicial Council referenced the "2024 regular session of General Conference."

The General Conference is the entity that has the authority to determine these matters. If the General Conference desires a decision from the Judicial Council then General Conference itself can ask such questions. I believe that we risk undermining the authority and balance of powers when we take actions that essentially pre-empt the authority of another body within our denominational structure, including the full and equal participation of laity (which is wholly absent when the body is composed exclusively of clergy and/or Bishops). I pray that we will endeavor to be more sensitive and aware in circumstances such as these.

GCORR Equity Monitoring Report No. 4

United Methodists throughout the world are bound together in a connectional covenant in which we support and hold each other accountable for faithful discipleship and mission. Integrally holding connectional unity and local freedom, we seek to proclaim and embody the gospel in ways responsible to our specific cultural and social

context while maintaining "a vital web of interactive relationships" (*Book of Discipline*, para. 132).

The complexity of and need for this ecclesiological vision for how we are to live in relationship was audibly and visibly on display

during the Thursday morning plenary. Delegates first approved calendar items related to supporting worldwide regionalization. That shifted into the poignant moment of hearing and then approving the request by the Eurasia Conference to become peacefully independent from The United Methodist Church. Immediately thereafter, delegates held discussion on the Constitutional changes required for regionalization; it was also affirmed. Some of the equity questions underlying these decisions are:

Who will benefit from this legislation and in what ways?

Who will gain power (authority, access, increased funding) from this legislation?

Who will lose power (authority, access, decrease funding) from this legislation?

Earlier Thursday morning you saw the results of the nomination and election of officers for the legislative committees:

Asian Female—4 Asian Male—3 Black Female—10 Black Male—14 Hispanic/Latina Female—2 Hispanic/Latino Male—2 Multiracial Female—4 Multiracial Male—1 Pacific Islander Female—1 White Female—17 White Male—11 White Non-binary—1

While the percentages still show a larger number of white United States officers, it also reveals a shift toward the "vital web of interactive relationships" that we affirm in our **Book of Discipline**. In our desire for institutional equity, we asked the following question: During nominations, did the Process, the Space, and Introductions of Committee members enhance or inhibit elections, participation, and/or relationship building? The lens of equity invites us to also consider what impact these elections could have on specific constituencies of a worldwide United

Methodist Church.

Because of the historic racialization of skin color, some categories do not clearly identify the full range of nations represented among elected delegates. The preliminarily reported numbers were not detailed enough to capture 21 central conference delegates, 15 from African conferences and 3 from Philippine conferences, elected as primary officers or as chairs of sub-committees. Only one committee did not elect someone from a central conference. Some themes that emerged from the monitor reports of the process:

- Some monitors were acknowledged and introduced; others acknowledged but not named.
- Introductions of Committee Members to each other were requested proactively by some presiding Bishops; some introductions occurred only after the insistence of a committee member.
- Interpreters seemed to be in place more often, though at least one situation required stopping the process until one arrived.

Finally, persistent concerns around worship are being expressed daily. This is not focused on the gifted artists providing the General Conference with rich centering opportunities. At what has been called a seminal moment in our movement toward a more equitable and vibrant worldwide United Methodist Church, most worship components have been in English delivered by United States participants. How might things be experienced differently if liturgies were on screen in all of the official languages on screen? What if worship leaders, music selections, and artists reflected the global interactive relationships we affirm? Moving into the future, our General Conferences will require consideration of who sits at the table of planning and decision-making.

Thursday, April 25, 2024

The day began with a great majority of participants in the Conference dressed in black as we joined with people around the world to recognize the World Council of Churches' Thursdays in Black initiative that is working towards a world without rape and violence. The need for the Church to no longer be silent on this critical issue was brought home in a powerful manner by Bishop LaTrelle Easterling as she preached from the perspective of her own experience. We have indeed been called out of our silence

As the morning plenary session began, we welcomed Bishop David M. Wilson to preside and celebrated his presence as the first Native American presider for a General Conference session. He called us to order and offered prayer in his native language. We continued in celebration as Bishop Tracy Smith Malone, who will be the first Black female to be president of the Council of Bishops, presided over the second part of the morning. It was a historic morning.


During the plenary, 56% of the presenters from the stage identified as female and 44% identified as male. In this same session, 59% of the speakers from the floor identified as male, 34% identified as female and 7% identified as nonbinary.


Legislative committees convened after lunch. Reports from the various committees reflect that some of the hiccups from the first day of organizational meetings have been overcome and that we are moving forward to a closer model of holy conferencing.

We still have work to do, especially as the subcommittees meet. It is in these settings where it continues to be necessary to clearly identify oneself before speaking and to be especially careful about not speaking over one another. It is

also important that everyone in the room notice whose voices are not being heard and what is preventing those voices from being heard.

As we go into this new day, let us pledge to ourselves and each other to be the best representatives of God's amazing love and grace.

Plan of Organization and Rules of Order for the General Conference

2	PREAMBLE
3	From the days of John Wesley, the "People called Methodist" have gathered and
4	continue to gather for Christian conferencing as a means of grace. The early
5	Methodists, even as they attended to practical needs of the movement, focused
6	primarily on spiritual matters. The spiritual affairs of the Church and its mission
7	are always before the body whether or not they are apparent in the passions of
8	debate on temporal concerns. Through Christian conferencing the Church comes
9	together, seeking unity in the midst of diversity, always desiring to know the
LO	mind of Christ. The General Conference is the representative, deliberative body
l1	for The United Methodist Church. It has developed an orderly, rational, and fair
L2	process for making majority decisions in the practical affairs of the Church; yet,
L3	it also protects the rights of minority positions. The delegates come together in
L4	firm conviction that the unity of United Methodism is God's will and the best
15	way to "spread scriptural holiness" in this global movement of the Church.
L6	The purpose of the Plan of Organization and Rules of Order is to help the
L7	General Conference be a means of grace, discerning God's will and striving for
L8	Christ-like wisdom in all of our decisions. In the midst of deliberation, we may
L9	pause, listen in silence, pray together, and refocus our vision on where the Spirit
20	is leading the Church. These times of silence, prayer, and discernment may be
21	varied and surprising. While they are not substitutes for respectful and orderly
22	debate, they do serve to hold our temporal affairs up to the light of the larger,
23	common mission of The United Methodist Church to make disciples of Jesus
24	Christ for the transformation of the world. Trusting that God is at work
25	throughout all of life, the General Conference invites the Church and others to
26	observe our deliberations by conducting our business in open meetings
27	(consistent with ¶ 722 of the <i>Book of Discipline</i>).

28	PLAN OF ORGANIZATION	
29	I. Opening Session and Organization	
30	The General Conference will assemble at the set time and place beginning with	
31	worship. The opening business session of the Conference shall be called to	
32	order by the bishop designated, as provided in the <i>Book of Discipline</i> \P 16.11.	
33	The following order of business shall be observed:	
34	A. Roll Call. The record of attendance shall be made in writing to the Secretary

52	II. Episcopal, Laity, and Young People Addresses	
53	The Quadrennial Addresses shall be delivered early in the Conference, at such	
54	hour as determined by the Commission on the General Conference. The Council	1
55	of Bishops shall coordinate the preparation and presentation of the Quadrennial	
56	Episcopal Address. The Association of Annual Conference Lay Leaders shall	
57	coordinate the preparation and presentation of the Quadrennial Lay Address.	
58	The opportunity to present shall be open to all annual conference lay leaders.	

59	The United Methodist Division of Ministries with Young People shall
60	coordinate the preparation and presentation of the Quadrennial Young People
61	Address. The opportunity to present shall be open to all young people.
62	III. Presiding Officers
63	The presiding officers for the plenaries of the Conference, the opening plenary
64	excepted (See Section I), shall be chosen from among the active bishops by the

67	A. The Secretary of the General Conference shall be responsible for all

71	B. The Secretary of the General Conference shall select persons from the clergy
72	and lay membership of The United Methodist Church to serve on the secretarial

74	C. The Conference shall elect, upon nomination by the Secretary of the General

76	Agenda and Calendar in presenting reports in such order as to expedite the

79	D. The Secretary of the General Conference shall appoint a Petitions Secretary
80	who shall prepare the petitions, resolutions, and reports that meet the
81	requirements of Book of Discipline \P 507 for reference to the appropriate
82	legislative committee, subject to review by the Committee on Reference (See
83	Section VII.A.7).
84	E. A budget for the work of the Secretary of the General Conference shall be
85	presented by the Commission on the General Conference to the General Council
86	on Finance and Administration. Such budget shall be paid out of the General
87	Administration Fund.

88	F. If in the interim of the quadrennial sessions of the General Conference the
89	office of the Secretary of the General Conference shall be vacated for any

139	Bishops at its fall meeting preceding the General Conference. All except the
140	Committee on Correlation and Editorial Revision shall be from the elected
141	delegates to the General Conference (See Section V). Members of
142	administrative committees that meet prior to the day on which the General
143	Conference convenes shall receive the delegate per diem for each additional day
144	on which their attendance is required. Delegates who are appointed to such

148	1) Agenda and Calendar
149	(a) There shall be a Committee on Agenda and Calendar composed of fifteen
150	members, one from each central conference and jurisdiction, at least six of
151	whom shall be laypersons; the Coordinator of the Calendar; the Chairperson of
152	the Program Committee of the Commission on the General Conference or
153	designee; and the Chairperson of the Commission on the General Conference or
154	designee.
155	No member of the committee shall be chairperson of a legislative committee or
156	a staff person of any general agency. The committee shall be convened, for the
157	purpose of organization, by the Secretary of the General Conference, or
158	designee, at least the day before the opening of the General Conference.
159	Following the presentation and adoption of the report of the Commission on the
160	General Conference at the opening session of the General Conference, the
161	Committee on Agenda and Calendar shall immediately become responsible for
162	guiding the order of business of the Conference.
163	(b) The Committee on Agenda and Calendar shall:
164	(1) Present calendar reports in such an order as to expedite the business
165	of the Conference,
166	(2) Inform the bishop presiding as soon as possible of the agenda items,
167	including order of priority, to be considered,
168	(3) Keep an overview of calendar progress;
169	(4) Report recommendations to each session of the General Conference
170	concerning business agenda, including time allocation and order in
171	which legislative committee reports shall be presented;
172	(5) Give priority in plenary for legislative consideration as
173	calendar items become available: to items affecting the global

174	church, items with financial implications, items supported by the
175	legislative committee, and items with minority reports;
176	(6) Announce, at the last plenary session of each day, a tentative agenda
177	for the next day;
178	(7) Consult daily with the legislative committee chairpersons to
179	expedite the business of the General Conference; and
180	(8) Receive all requests for special orders of the day, except those in the
181	report of the Commission on the General Conference on the first day of
182	the Conference.
183	(c) Proposals, questions, communications, resolutions, and other matters not
184	included in the regular business of the General Conference shall be referred to
185	the Committee on Agenda and Calendar without motion or debate. This
186	committee shall determine whether the matter presented shall be considered by
187	the General Conference. A decision of this committee may be appealed by
188	submitting to the Conference the signatures of ten delegates. The item shall be
189	presented to the Conference if the appeal is supported by a one-third vote.
190	2) Correlation and Editorial Revision
191	There shall be a Committee on Correlation and Editorial Revision of eight
192	persons and two alternates not delegates to the General Conference, and the
193	Book Editor or designee, who shall be an ex-officio member. They shall be
194	entitled to reimbursement of expenses for attendance at meetings of the
195	committee. The Book Editor or designee shall convene the committee for the

208	3) Courtesies and Privileges
209	There shall be a Committee on Courtesies and Privileges composed of twelve
210	members, one from each central conference and jurisdiction, at least six of
211	whom shall be laypersons. The committee shall be convened by a bishop for the
212	purpose of organization. The committee has the following duties and
213	responsibilities:
214	(a) To consider all matters of privilege and, as appropriate, to recommend to the
215	Conference that they be heard.
216	(b) To consider resolutions of commendation, courtesy, appreciation, etc.,
217	submitted in writing by delegates. The committee may initiate similar
218	resolutions and may edit and amend those submitted to it. Resolutions approved

222	(c) To arrange for extending appropriate courtesies of the Conference.
223	(d) To limit its report, including the statement of the chairperson and the
224	hearing of such persons as may be presented, to a maximum of ten minutes in
225	any one business day. No person or persons shall be presented whose request
226	has been denied by the Commission on the General Conference, nor after the
227	sixth day unless approved by a two-thirds vote of the Conference (See Rule
228	31.6).
229	4) Credentials
230	There shall be a Committee on Credentials composed of twelve members,
231	one from each central conference and jurisdiction, at least six of whom shall
232	be laypersons. The committee shall be convened by a bishop for the purpose

233	of organization. The committee shall provide guidance to the Secretary of
234	the General Conference regarding the approval of credentials of delegates,
235	and may review decisions regarding the seating of delegates, including
236	reserve delegates. The committee shall report to the General Conference its
237	decisions and recommendations regarding challenges to the seating of any
238	delegates.
239	5) Journal
240	There shall be a Committee on the Journal of three delegates to approve daily
241	the record of Proceedings of the General Conference prepared by the Secretary
242	of the General Conference and assistant(s). The committee shall be convened by
243	a bishop for the purpose of organization.
244	6) Presiding Officers
245	There shall be a Committee on Presiding Officers composed of twelve
246	members, one from each central conference and jurisdiction, six of whom shall
247	be clergy and six of whom shall be laypersons. The committee shall be
248	convened by a bishop for the purpose of organization. The committee shall
249	select and notify the presiding officer(s) of each plenary session at least 24
250	hours in advance, insofar as possible. The committee shall be free to select a
251	bishop for more than one session and to change the presiding officer during the
252	session, whenever it seems advisable (See Section III).
252	7) D C
253	7) Reference
254	There shall be a Committee on Reference composed of twenty-four members,
255	one clergy and one lay person from each central conference and jurisdiction.
256	The membership of this committee shall include at least one member from each
257	legislative committee who will be designated as petition coordinator for their
258	legislative committee. If possible, petition coordinators should have served
259	previously on a General Conference legislative committee. These petition
260	coordinators shall serve as advisors to the officers of the legislative committee
261	of which they are members. Additional members from the Committee on
262	Reference shall assist the petition coordinator in the legislative committee of
263	which they are members. This committee shall be convened, for the purpose of

264	organization, by the Secretary of the General Conference, or designee, the day
265	prior to the opening of the General Conference.
266	(a) After reviewing the proposed assignments by the Secretary of the General
267	Conference of the petitions, resolutions, and similar communications dealing
268	with the regular business of the Conference to legislative committees, this
269	committee shall refer the same to the appropriate legislative committees (See
270	Section IV.D). This committee shall also be responsible for reviewing the
271	assignment, by the Secretary of the General Conference, of all reports,
272	recommendations, and resolutions from general agencies, standing or special
273	commissions and committees, and all other communications which are
274	submitted to the Secretary of the General Conference after the convening of the
275	General Conference, all of which shall be referred directly to appropriate
276	legislative committees without presentation to a plenary session of the General
277	Conference.
278	(b) The Committee on Reference may withdraw an item that has been assigned
279	to a committee, either upon a request or upon its own motion. It may also
280	withhold from reference or publication any document it shall deem improper.
281	(c) The Secretary of the General Conference, or the Petitions Secretary, may
282	withhold from publication any petitions deemed defamatory to a private
283	individual or obscene. The Committee on Reference shall review all such
284	decisions.
285	(d) Where the committee finds two or more substantially identical petitions, it
286	may group them under one title and number, indicating the total number of
287	petitions.
288	(e) No petitions shall be assigned by the Committee on Reference to any
289	General Conference committee unless they meet the requirements of the Book of
290	Discipline.

291	B. Advance Legislative Research Panel
292	(a) There shall be an Advance Legislative Research Panel chosen by the
293	Executive Committee of the Commission on the General Conference, composed
294	of a number of members equal to the number of legislative committees.
295	(b) Panel members shall be chosen based on their comprehensive knowledge of
296	the Book of Discipline as evidenced by their previous participation in the life of
297	the general church through service on the Judicial Council, the Committee on
298	Correlation and Editorial Revision, or as a conference chancellor. Panel
299	members must be willing to volunteer significant hours prior to General
300	Conference.
301	(c) All petitions received, after being compiled by Disciplinary paragraphs, shall
302	be assigned by legislative committee among the panel members. The panel
303	members, in turn, will review all the petitions they have been assigned and
304	locate any other paragraphs of the Book of Discipline, including the
305	Constitution, which are closely related to the subject matter of the petition, as
306	well as closely related Judicial Council decisions and memoranda. The panel
307	member shall then record the related paragraph, decision, or memoranda with
308	each petition.
309	(d) No judgment or editorial comment about any petition shall be
310	included.
311	(e) The notation of related paragraphs shall become a permanent attachment to
312	the petition as it goes through the General Conference legislative committee
313	process.
314	(f) The legislative committees will consider how related paragraphs would
315	impact or be impacted by adopting such a petition.
316	(g) The Advance Legislative Research Panel's work shall be coordinated by the
317	Petitions Secretary.
318	(h) A panel member is not precluded from being a delegate to General
319	Conference.

320	C. Committee on Etnics
321	There shall be a Committee on Ethics, comprised of the members of the
322	Committee of the Plan of Organization and Rules of Order of the General
323	Conference. Individual delegates may report their concerns about alleged
324	violations of the rules to the Office of the Secretary of the General Conference.
325	The Office of the Secretary of the General Conference shall investigate, attempt
326	to resolve all such claims, and report the resolution to the Committee on Ethics
327	and to the delegate(s) who raised the concern. Based on the severity of the
328	concerns, the Office of the Secretary of the General Conference may refer the
329	matter to the Committee on Ethics. Alleged violations of the rules may also be
330	referred directly to the Committee on Ethics by a one-fifth vote of the Plenary.
331	The Committee on Ethics shall review all matters referred to it and report its
332	findings to the Plenary with recommended action.

356	E. Legislative Committees
357	There shall be legislative committees to whom all properly submitted petitions
358	and reports shall be assigned. The Commission on the General Conference shall
359	set the number of legislative committees and the assignment of Disciplinary
360	paragraphs and topics to those committees in consultation with the Secretary of
361	the General Conference and the Business Manager of the General Conference

406	Consistent with the spirit of \P 722 in the <i>Book of Discipline</i> , meetings of
407	General Conference committees and subcommittees shall be open.
408	2) Administrative Committees
409	(a) A bishop appointed by the Council of Bishops and an organizing secretary
410	appointed by the Secretary of the General Conference shall serve, respectively
411	as chairperson and secretary, to organize the committees, except where other
412	provision is specified.
413	(b) The election of chairperson, vice-chairperson and secretary of each
414	administrative committee shall be by separate sequential written ballot for each
415	position. Due consideration shall be given for inclusiveness that reflects the
416	global nature of the church, including gender, age, ethnicity, geography, young

418	3) Legislative Committees
419	All legislative committees shall meet for organization at such time as the
420	Commission on the General Conference shall determine. A bishop appointed by
421	the Council of Bishops and an organizing secretary appointed by the Secretary
422	of the General Conference shall serve, respectively, as chairperson and
423	secretary, to organize each of the several committees. The first meeting of the
424	legislative committees shall be held as soon as possible following the first
425	plenary session of the General Conference. The orientation of the committee,
426	followed by the election of officers, shall be the order of business of the first
427	meeting of the committee.
428	(a) Election of Officers. The chairperson, vice-chairperson, secretary, and sub-
429	committee chairpersons of each committee shall be elected by separate
430	sequential written ballot for each position. Due consideration shall be given for
431	inclusiveness that reflects the global nature of the church, including gender, age,
432	ethnicity, geography, young people, clergy, and lay. If no election by simple
433	majority vote of those voting has occurred after three (3) consecutive ballots,
434	the floor will be reopened for nominations.

435	(b) Training. The Secretary of the General Conference shall be responsible for
436	training all chairpersons, vice-chairpersons, secretaries, and sub-committee
437	chairpersons of legislative committees. The training shall include instruction in
438	their duties, all procedures in the handling of petitions, the times of the daily
439	deadline for publishing reports, and other information to expedite the work of
440	the committees. The Commission on the General Conference shall arrange for a
441	time and place for such a training session. No officer shall serve without
442	completing this training.
443	(c) Parliamentarians. Each legislative committee shall be assigned a
444	parliamentarian by the Secretary of the General Conference. Retired bishops
445	nominated by the Council of Bishops shall be included in the pool of
446	parliamentarians. It shall be the responsibility of the Business Manager of the
447	General Conference to develop a pool of other people not currently delegates to
448	serve as parliamentarians. It is preferred that these persons be members of The
449	United Methodist Church, have knowledge of the Rules of the General
450	Conference, and have training in parliamentary procedure. The retired bishops
451	shall be given priority in being assigned to legislative committees. At the
452	invitation of the presiding officer, the parliamentarian advises on matters of
453	parliamentary procedure.
454	(d) Regular Meetings. The legislative committees shall meet for business as
455	scheduled by the Agenda and Calendar Committee unless otherwise ordered by
456	the Conference, and at such other times as the committees may determine
457	provided that no legislative committee shall meet at times that conflict with
458	plenary sessions.
459	(e) Voting Area. Each legislative committee and sub-committee shall
460	establish an area in which only voting committee members and their
461	properly credentialed assistant or translator will be seated. The Business
462	Manager of the General Conference shall provide four designated seats in
463	each legislative committee for the monitors from the General Commission
464	on Religion and Race and the General Commission on the Status and Role
465	of Women. An area shall also be established for those present with voice but
466	not vote (See Section VII.F.2). Staff members of the Secretary of General

467	Conference and Business Manager of General Conference may speak in the
468	performance of their duties. General agency staff, other resource persons,
469	and visitors may speak only when authorized, in each instance by vote of
470	one-third of the committee or sub-committee or by invitation of the chair
471	(See Rule 31.3).
472	(f) Minority Reports. Minority reports allow for the expression of differing
473	views held by a significant portion of a legislative committee and may be
474	offered in accordance with Rules 29, 38, and 39.
475	(g) Reports. Legislative Committee Reports should be submitted as soon as
476	possible following the action of the committee. All Legislative Committee
477	Reports shall be submitted prior to 5 P.M. on Monday of the second week.
478	H. Function and Authority of Committees
479	1) The administrative committees, without specific instruction or direction from
480	the Conference, shall assume responsibility for considering and reporting to the
481	Conference upon all matters that fall within their respective responsibilities (See
482	Section VII.A).
483	2) The legislative committees shall consider and report upon that which is
484	referred to them by the Committee on Reference or which has been referred to
485	them directly by the Conference (See Rule 36).
486	VIII. Proposal Involving Expenditure of Unbudgeted Funds
487	A. Any action proposed to the General Conference plenary to establish an
488	interim or continuing board, commission, committee, or task force shall be
489	referred to the General Council on Finance and Administration and the
490	Connectional Table or their executive committees or their expenditure review
491	group for a report and recommendation before final action is taken. The General
492	Council on Finance and Administration and the Connectional Table or their
493	executive committees or their expenditure review group shall provide the
494	General Conference with the following before action is taken:
495	1) an estimated budget for the proposed board, commission, committee or task
496	force for the next quadrennium; and

506	identified as such; otherwise, they shall be considered as having been included

509	the General Council on Finance and Administration and the Connectional
510	Table or their executive committees or their expenditure review group at least
511	seventy-two hours prior to the scheduled adjournment of the General
512	Conference.
513	IX. Delegate Expenses
514	A. Full travel expenses and per diem shall be paid for the number of allotted
515	voting delegates from each conference according to the report of the chairperson
516	of each annual conference delegation. If during the conference, a reserve
517	delegate is seated for a principal delegate for one or more full days, the principal
518	delegate shall adjust the per diem with such reserve based on the time served by
519	each.
520	B. Air travel shall be by the most economical round-trip coach airfare
521	directly to and from the site of the General Conference. Special
522	excursion and promotional fares shall be utilized whenever possible.
523	Additional expenses may be allowed delegates from conferences outside
524	the United States for arrival and departure not to exceed two days before
525	or after General Conference. The per diem expense allowance for all

530	C. When one or more delegates come in the same automobile, the owner will be
531	reimbursed for the actual cost of travel (parking, en route mileage and tolls, en
532	route meals and lodging). Mileage shall be reimbursed at the business rate

534	General Conference and return. Meals and lodging shall be reimbursed up to the
535	established General Conference per diem. When the round trip exceeds 1,000

551	Archives and History or referral to the Committee on Reference.
552	B. The Book Editor, the Secretary of the General Conference, the Publisher of
553	The United Methodist Church, and the Committee on Correlation and Editorial
554	Revision shall be charged with editing the Book of Discipline. Any Disciplinary
555	amendments that are not dependent on constitutional amendments for their
556	effective date will be incorporated in the appropriate paragraphs of the Book of
557	Discipline in the order of their adoption.

558 The editors, in the exercise of their judgment, shall have the authority to make 559 changes in wording as may be necessary to harmonize legislation without 560 changing its substance. The editors, in consultation with the Judicial Council, 561 shall also have authority to delete provisions of the Book of Discipline that have 562 been ruled unconstitutional by the Judicial Council. Any challenge of a decision 563 made by the Committee on Correlation and Editorial Revision shall be in 564 writing. If the matter should go to the Judicial Council, the appealing party shall 565 give notice thereof to the committee. Any established errata in the *Book of* 566 Discipline shall be forwarded by The United Methodist Publishing House to the 567 Council of Bishops, the Secretary of the General Conference, Annual 568 Conference Secretaries, and Annual Conference Directors of Connectional 569 Ministries, and shall be published by the Book Editor on The United Methodist 570 Publishing House website. 571 Constitutional amendments certified in accordance with ¶ 59 and enabling 572 legislation adopted in anticipation of the constitutional amendments shall be 573 published by the Book Editor on the United Methodist Publishing House 574 website following certification. They shall be published in the subsequent Book 575 of Discipline. The constitutional amendments take effect at the time of 576 certification. The enabling legislation will be effective on January 1, of the year 577 following the certification of the constitutional amendments and will be given 578 effect as if it had been adopted after all other Disciplinary changes affecting a 579 particular paragraph. 580 XI. Distribution of Materials within the Bar of the Conference 581 After the first day, only the *Daily Christian Advocate*, and materials related to 582 General Conference presentations and produced by official bodies of The 583 United Methodist Church, and properly received amendments and substitutions, 584 if approved by the Secretary of the General Conference, shall be distributed by 585 the pages. Pages will distribute communications to individual delegates 586 provided the communication bears the name and location of both the recipient 587 and the sender.

588	XII. Distribution of Materials Outside of the Plenary or Committee Room
589	Newsletters or any special interest material from United Methodist boards,
590	agencies, and related United Methodist groups may be distributed under the
591	following conditions:
592	A. One copy of each item shall be submitted to the office of the Commission on
593	the General Conference in advance of distribution.
594	B. Material distributed shall be relevant to the General Conference and not for
595	soliciting membership in an organization.
596	C. No distributor shall be allowed to distribute within the convention center
597	unless they have obtained written approval from the Business Manager of
598	the General Conference. Each group shall have one contact person who
599	shall register all group members and receive identification for each
600	member.
601	D. Distribution shall be at least 30 feet outside any entrance door to the plenary
602	or committee meeting room.
603	E. Distribution shall be done by representatives of the above-named groups. It is
604	the responsibility of the distributors not to impede or interfere with the entrance
605	or exit of persons or to hamper the general flow of pedestrian traffic.
606	F. Distributors are responsible for the disposal of unused or unclaimed
607	materials.
608	G. Distributors violating these regulations will be prohibited from future
609	distributions.
610	XIII. Reports to Be Distributed Before General Conference
611	The reports, recommendations, and resolutions requiring action by the General
612	Conference, as well as petitions submitted in accordance with the Book of
613	$Discipline \P$ 507.7, shall first be assigned a Petition Number by the Secretary of
614	the General Conference or the Petitions Secretary and then shall be published in
615	an Advance Edition of the Daily Christian Advocate and distributed to all

delegates and to the first clergy and first lay reserve delegates at least ninety days prior to the opening of the General Conference. Reports shall be published in the same style as the *Daily Christian Advocate*. In order to accomplish this, the finished copy of all such reports and recommendations shall be submitted to the editor of the *Daily Christian Advocate* at least 230 days prior to the opening of the General Conference.³ Reports and recommendations not published in an Advance Edition of the *Daily Christian Advocate* may be received by the General Conference only upon three-fourths vote of the General Conference. The General Council on Finance and Administration shall be exempt from this requirement to the extent necessary to allow inclusion of general funds receipts information for the first three years of the quadrennium. The General Council on Finance and Administration will provide data including the third year of the quadrennium and other appropriate information to delegates prior to the convening of the General Conference.

679	III. Rights and Duties of Delegates
580	Rule 5. Attendance and Seating Reserves
581	(1) The chairperson of each delegation shall be provided with a form on which
582	to report daily the attendance of its delegates. All delegates arriving after the
583	opening roll call shall be reported by the chairperson of the delegation to the
584	Secretary of the General Conference or designee. No delegate who is duly
585	registered, unless hindered by sickness or other emergency, shall be absent from
586	the sessions of the Conference without permission of the Conference. All
587	absences shall be reported by the chairpersons of the delegations to the
588	Secretary of the General Conference or designee on a form provided for this
589	purpose.

690	(2) Any reserve seated in the place of a regular delegate shall have been duly
691	elected as a reserve delegate by the annual conference and shall meet the
692	requirements set forth in the <i>Book of Discipline</i> ¶¶ 34-36. Delegates, including
693	reserves when the latter are substituted for a delegate or delegates, shall be
694	seated in the order of their election, except when a reserve is seated temporarily
695	or in case of special need as determined by the delegation chairperson. The
696	reserve shall occupy the seat of the delegate for whom the substitution is made.
697	Reserves shall not be seated for delegates presenting on the platform. Reserve
698	delegates are to function within the Rules of Procedure of the General
699	Conference (See Rules 29 and 33). A reserve delegate may be seated upon
700	authority of the chairperson of the delegation who shall report the substitution in
701	writing to the Secretary of the General Conference or designee on a form
702	provided for this purpose. Reserves are chosen to be seated:
703	(1) by reason of being of the same order as the absent delegate,
704	(2) in order of their election as reserve delegates.
705	If the substitution is challenged, the Committee on Credentials after consultation
706	with the chairperson of the delegation may report its recommendation to the
707	General Conference.
708	Rule 6. Directions for Securing the Plenary Floor
709	A delegate desiring to speak to the Conference shall register in the manner(s)
710	provided. The presiding bishop shall choose from the requests and direct the
711	speaker to the appropriate microphone. The bishop presiding shall consider
712	the various sections of the auditorium in rotation. The delegate recognized
713	shall first announce her or his name and the name of the conference
714	represented and their reason for speaking. A delegate recognized by the
715	presiding bishop may not yield the floor to another delegate. In the event of
716	tablet failure, a delegate desiring to speak to the Conference shall hold up the
717	appropriate placard to be recognized by the bishop presiding.
718	Rule 7. Plenary Speakers For and Against
719	(1) When the report of a committee is under consideration, it shall be the duty of
720	the bishop presiding to ascertain, when recognizing a delegate to the

721	Conference, on which side the delegate proposes to speak; the bishop presiding
722	shall not assign the floor to any delegate proposing to speak on the same side of
723	the pending question as the speaker immediately preceding if any delegate
724	desires to speak on the other side.
725	(2) Except for non-debatable motions (Rule 23), no report shall be adopted or
726	question relating to the same decided, without opportunity having been given
727	for at least two speeches for and two against the said proposal.
728	(3) The motion to call for the previous question, which is itself non-debatable,
729	is not in order without opportunity having been given for at least two speeches
730	for and two against the proposal. Any delegate who moves to call for the
731	previous question (that is, that the vote be now taken on the motion or motions
732	pending) shall also indicate to what it is intended to apply, if any secondary
733	motion or motions are also pending. If said delegate does not so indicate, it
734	shall be regarded as applying only to the immediately pending question. This
735	motion shall be taken without debate and shall require a two-thirds vote of
736	those present and voting for its adoption. If it is adopted, the vote shall be taken
737	on the motion or motions to which it applies without further debate (See Rule
738	23). After three speeches for and three against and provided no secondary
739	motions come before the floor, the questions shall be put automatically.
740	However, the chairperson and/or duly authorized delegate or delegates
741	presenting the committee's report, and if there is a minority report, the
742	presenter shall be entitled to speak before the vote is taken (See Rule 29).
743	These speeches shall be limited to three (3) minutes (See Rule 9). After three
744	speeches for and three against, if there are secondary motions on the floor, the
745	motion to call for the previous question is non-debatable and shall be put to the
746	vote after the presider provides the number of speakers in the pool for speeches
747	for, speeches against, and amendments.
748	Rule 8. Interrupting the Speaker
749	No delegate who has the floor may be interrupted except for a point of order, a
750	parliamentary inquiry, a point of information, or to call attention that the time
751	has arrived for an order of the day.

- 752 Rule 9. Speaking More Than Once; Length of Speech
- 753 (1) No delegate shall speak a second time on the same question if any delegate
- who has not previously spoken on the question desires the floor.
- 755 (2) No delegate shall speak more than twice on the same subject under the same
- motion, except as provided in Rule 7.2
- 757 (3) No delegate shall speak longer than three minutes unless that time is
- 758 extended by the body (See Rule 7.3). Time of translation shall not count against
- 759 the three-minute limit.
- 760 (4) The three-minute limit on delegate speeches may be amended by a majority
- vote of the body at any time and for any period of duration.
- 762 Rule 10. Point of Order
- A delegate wishing to raise a point of order shall register a request to speak in
- the manner provided by the Commission on the General Conference and
- explained by the presider. The presiding officer shall interrupt the proceeding. If
- a delegate is speaking, that one shall immediately yield the floor. The presiding
- officer shall then direct the delegate raising the point of order to first cite the
- 768 rule involved and then state the point as briefly and concisely as possible. The
- delegate shall not presume to decide the question or argue the point. A point of
- order is decided by the presiding officer without debate unless in doubtful cases
- the presiding officer submits the question to the body for advice or decision.
- When the presiding officer rules on a point, debate is closed, but the decision
- may be appealed (See Rule 3).
- 774 Rule 11. Bar of the Conference
- 775 The bar of the conference shall provide for the integrity of the General
- 776 Conference. It is for delegates, pages, and others who have been granted access
- 777 to the area for General Conference business as provided through the Rules or
- through the suspension of the Rules.
- 779 Rule 12. Distracting Behavior
- 780 A spirit of Christian conferencing is expected. Delegates are not to distract
- others. Audible cell-phone use is not permitted in the plenary hall or the

782	legislative committee rooms. All electronic devices shall be muted or turned
783	off. In addition, the use of electronic devices should be in a manner that
784	does not disturb other participants. Respect should be shown in the use of
785	social media at all times. Verbal and non-verbal distractions are prohibited.
786	The presiding officer or members of the General Conference staff may ask
787	individuals to leave the plenary hall or the legislative committee room if
788	they persist in behavior that interferes with the participation of other
789	delegates.
790	Rule 13. Electronic Recording
791	No electronic recording by either video or audio may be made of any portion of
792	the General Conference unless specifically authorized by the Business Manager
793	of the General Conference in order to maintain the integrity of all performance
794	licenses.
795	Rule 14. Right to Make Motions
796	Only voting delegates have the right to make or second motions in accordance
797	with the rules and upon recognition by the presiding officer.
798	Rule 15. Plenary Voting Procedure
799	(1) Voting shall be by electronic means unless otherwise ordered
800	by the Conference, provided, however, that in elections, voting
801	may be by written ballot. Electronic voting devices shall be
802	available on the platform for delegates making a presentation to the
803	Conference.
804	(2) When electronic voting is not in use or operating, a standing count vote
805	or vote by written ballot may be ordered on call of any delegate, supported
806	by one-third of the delegates present and voting, with pages serving as
807	tellers.
808	(3) Only delegates within the bar of the Conference when the vote is taken shall
809	be entitled to vote. No delegate shall cast a vote in place of any other delegate.
810	(4) No other business shall be in order when a vote is being taken or when the
811	previous question has been called until the process is completed, except such as

812 813	relates to the vote itself or such business as the presiding officer may deem appropriate.
814 815	(5) Delegates are free to vote according to their conscience without interference by others observing, monitoring, or recording their votes. Persons shall not give
816	or accept bribes or threaten delegates in order to influence voting.
817	Rule 16. Elections
818	For any election requiring balloting by the plenary, an election shall occur when
819	the number of ballots cast for a nominee meets or exceeds the required
820	percentage of the total valid ballots cast.
821	A ballot is valid if it meets the following standards:
822	(1) It is cast by a voting delegate or properly seated reserve
823	delegate.
824	(2) It contains votes for the same number of nominees, as there are
825	vacancies to be filled.
826	(3) Every name receiving a vote has been properly nominated according
827	to the provisions.
828	(4) No more than one vote is cast for the same nominee.
829	(5) No vote is cast for a person who has already been elected.
830	Rule 17. Division of Question
831	Before a vote is taken, any delegate shall have the right to call for a division of
832	any question, if it is subject to such division as the delegate indicates. If no
833	delegate objects, the division shall be made; but if there is objection, the
834	presiding officer shall put the question of division to vote, not waiting for a
835	second.
836	IV. Behavior of Guests and Observers
837	Rule 18. Distracting Behavior
838	A spirit of Christian conferencing is expected. Guests and observers
839	are not to distract others. Audible cell-phone use is not permitted in the
840	plenary hall or the legislative committee rooms. All electronic devices
841	shall be muted or turned off. In addition, the use of electronic devices

842	should be in a manner that does not disturb other participants. Respect
843	should be shown in the use of social media at all times. Verbal and
844	non-verbal distractions are prohibited. The presiding officer or
845	members of the General Conference staff may ask individuals to leave
846	the plenary hall or the legislative committee room if they persist in
847	behavior that interferes with the participation of delegates. Guests and
848	observers are not to enter the bar of the conference except as provided
849	in Rule 11.
850	Rule 19. Electronic Recording
851	No electronic recording by either video or audio may be made of any portion of
852	the General Conference unless specifically authorized by the Business Manager
853	of the General Conference in order to maintain the integrity of all performance
854	licenses.
855	V. Business Procedure
856 857	Rule 20. Motion for Adoption of Legislative and Administrative Committee Reports
858	Whenever a report of a legislative committee or an administrative committee is
859	presented to the Conference for action, it shall be deemed in proper order for
860	consideration by the Conference without the formality of a second.
861 862	Rule 21. Required Forms for Reports, Resolutions, Motions, Amendments
863	All resolutions and committee reports shall be prepared in accordance with
864	instructions from the Secretary of the General Conference; and all motions,
865	including amendments, shall be presented in writing (See Rules 33.2, 34.3, 36.2,
866	38).
867	Rule 22. Alterations of Motions
868	When a motion is made and seconded, a resolution is introduced and seconded,
869	or a committee report is read or published in the Daily Christian Advocate, it
870	shall be deemed to be in the possession of the Conference and may not be
871	altered except by action of the Conference (See Rule 39).

8/2	Rule 25. Non-Debalable Molions
873	The following motions shall be acted upon without debate:
874	(1) To adjourn, when unqualified, except for final adjournment.
875	(2) To suspend the rules.
876	(3) To lay on the table.
877	No motion, which adheres to another motion or has another motion
878	adhering to it, can be laid on the table by itself. Such motions, if laid
879	on the table, carry with them the motions to which they adhere or
880	which adhere to them.
881	(4) To take from the table.
882	(5) To call for the previous questions, when in order (See Rules 7 and
883	24).
884	(6) To reconsider a non-debatable motion (See Rule 32).
885	(7) To limit or extend the limits of debate.
886	(8) To take time for prayerful discernment at the immediate moment.
887	(9) To request a Judicial Council decision (Book of Discipline ¶¶ 56.1,
888	2609.1).
889	Rule 24. Rights of the Main Question
890	The main question may be opened to debate under the following motions: to
891	adopt, to refer, to substitute, to postpone, or to reconsider. No new motion,
892	resolution, or subject shall be entertained until the one under consideration shall
893	have been disposed of except as provided in Rule 15.4. This rule does not apply
894	to secondary motions if otherwise allowable.
895	Rule 25. Precedence of Secondary Motions
896	If any one or more of the following motions shall be made when one or more
897	other motions are pending, the order of their precedence in relation to one
898	another shall be the same as the order of their listing below:
899	(1) To fix the time the conference shall adjourn (This motion is subject
900	to amendment, or it may be laid on the table.);
901	(2) To adjourn;
902	(3) To take a recess;
903	(4) To lay on the table:

904	(5) To call the previous question (See Rules 23.5, 28);
905	(6) To limit or extend the limits of debate;
906	(7) To postpone to a given time;
907	(8) To refer;
908	(9) To amend or to amend by substitution (one amendment being
909	allowed to an amendment);
910	(10) To postpone indefinitely.
910	(10) To posipone indefinitely.
911	Rule 26. Motion to Adjourn
912	The motion to adjourn, when unqualified, shall be taken without debate and
913	shall always be in order, except:
914	(1) When a delegate has the floor;
915	(2) When a question is actually put or a vote is being taken and before it
916	is finally decided;
917	(3) When the previous question has been called and action is pending;
918	(4) When a motion to adjourn has been lost and no business or debate
919	has intervened;
920	(5) When the motion to fix the time to which the Conference shall
921	adjourn is pending.
922	This rule does not apply to a motion for final adjournment of the Conference.
923	Rule 27. Final Adjournment
924	At final adjournment all unfinished business shall remain unfinished.
925	Rule 28. Procedure for Amending by Substitution
926	(1) When a resolution or committee report is properly before the Conference for
927	consideration and action, even if amendments are pending, a substitute may be
928	offered by any delegate moving that the same be substituted for the report,
929	resolution, or amendment under consideration. The substitute shall be an
930	alternative to what is before the body and not simply a negation of the main
931	motion.

932	(2) Debate on the motion to substitute will be limited to the question of						
933	substitution only. No amendments to the main motion or the substitute will be						
934	considered during this period of initial consideration.						
935	(3) Following the debate on the motion to substitute, a vote on substitution will						
936	occur. If the motion to substitute prevails by majority vote, the substitute motion						
937	becomes the main motion. If the motion to substitute fails to receive a majority						
938	vote, the original main motion remains on the floor for consideration. Debate						
939	including the offering of amendments moves forward on the main motion as per						
940	the rules of procedure.						
941	(4) The motion to call for the previous questions shall not be in order on the						
942	motion to substitute until opportunity has been given for at least two speakers						
943	on each side of the question.						
944	Rule 29. Minority Report						
945	A minority report may be attached to a report from a legislative committee in						
946	the following manner:						
947	(1) Delegates intending to offer a minority report must notify the chair						
948	of the committee within two hours (excluding breaks) of final						
949	committee action on the relative petition.						
950	(2) The chair of the legislative committee shall receive the minority						
951	report signed by 10 persons or 10% of the legislative committee						
952	membership (whichever is less) who voted against the proposal, whose						
953	names shall be attached to the request. A reserve delegate may sign the						
954	minority report only if seated as a voting delegate in the legislative						
955	committee at the time the committee acted upon the relevant petition.						
956	The committee and minority reports shall be submitted and presented						
957	together in the Daily Christian Advocate.						
958	(3) A minority report shall be presented as a substitute for the report of						
959	the committee, in conformity with Rule 28 and Rule 36 respectively,						
960	and it shall be managed in the plenary according to Rule 28 for						
961	substitute motions. The signers of the minority report shall select one of						

962	their signers to present the report as a substitute motion. In closing
963	debate on the motion to substitute, the delegate presenting the minority
964	report shall speak first and the presenter of the committee report shall be
965	last.
966	(4) If the motion to substitute the minority report for the majority report
967	prevails by majority vote of the plenary, the minority report becomes
968	the main motion. If the motion to substitute fails to prevail by a majority
969	vote of the plenary, the majority report of the committee remains on the
970	floor as the main motion for consideration. Debate including the
971	offering of amendments moves forward on the main motion as per the
972	rules of procedure.
973	Rule 30. Unlawful Motion After Speech
974	After making a speech on a pending question, a delegate may not make a
975	motion that would limit or stop debate without first relinquishing the floor.
976	Rule 31. Exceptions to Majority Vote
977	A majority of those voting, a quorum being present (Book of Discipline \P 506),
978	shall decide all questions, with the following exceptions:
979	(1) A one-fifth vote of the Conference shall be required to request a
980	Judicial Council decision (<i>Book of Discipline</i> $\P\P$ 56.1, 2609.1).
981	(2) A one-fifth vote of the Conference shall refer a matter to the
982	Committee on Ethics.
983	(3) A non-delegate may be invited to a full legislative committee or
984	sub-committee either by invitation of the chair or by one-third vote of
985	either body to speak for no more than three (3) minutes on any one
986	matter.
987	(4) One-third of those present and voting shall suffice to sustain a call
988	for a recorded vote in case the decision of the presiding officer is
989	challenged (See Rule 15.2).

990	(5) A tie vote sustains the presiding officer (Rule 3.1).
991	(6) A two-thirds vote shall be required to sustain a motion to suspend
992	(Rule 40) or amend (Rule 41) the rules; to set aside a special order
993	(Rule 33.1); to consider a special order before the time set therefore; to
994	sustain the request of the Committee on Courtesies and Privileges for
995	the presentation of any person after the sixth day of the General
996	Conference (See Section VII.A.3).
997	(7) A two-thirds vote shall be required to sustain a call for the previous
998	question.
999	(8) A two-thirds vote shall be required to approve a proposal for a
1000	constitutional amendment (<i>Book of Discipline</i> $\P\P$ 59-61).
1001	Rule 32. Reconsideration
1002	A motion to reconsider an action of the body shall be in order at any time if
1003	offered by a delegate who voted with the prevailing side. If the motion proposed
1004	for reconsideration was non-debatable, the motion to reconsider shall be non-
1005	debatable (See Rule 23).
1006	Rule 33. Regular Calendar and Consent Calendar
1007	(1) The Secretary of the General Conference shall keep the Calendar which
1008	includes the orders of the day and the reports of committees (See Rule 39).
1009	Business placed on the calendar shall be considered in the order recommended
1010	by the Committee on Agenda and Calendar, unless by two-thirds vote of the
1011	Conference, an item is taken up out of order (See Rule 31.6).
1012	(2) Whenever possible, a legislative committee shall recommend for adoption
1013	only one calendar item for each paragraph or sub-paragraph in the Book of
1014	Discipline. All other related petitions shall be combined for rejection or referral.
1015	(3) Action from a legislative committee shall be placed on the Consent Calendar
1016	if:
1017	(a) No more than ten votes were cast against the prevailing position in
1018	the committee;

1019	(b) The item has been previously published in the <i>Daily Christian</i>					
1020	Advocate;					
1021	(c) The item has been in the hands of delegates for at least 24 hours;					
1022	(d) The item is neither a constitutional amendment nor one having					
1023	financial implications; and					
1024	(e) No minority report is attached (See Rule 29).					
1025	(4) The Daily Christian Advocate shall clearly identify the Consent Calendar,					
1026	which will list items in three sections sub-headed as follows:					
1027	(a) Disciplinary Items Recommended for Adoption.					
1028	(b) Non-Disciplinary Items Recommended for Adoption.					
1029	(c) Items Recommended for Referral.					
1030	(5) The Consent Calendar shall be called up daily pursuant to Rule 2. Adoption					
1031	of the Consent Calendar by vote of the Conference shall be deemed action on all					
1032	calendar items on the Consent Calendar.					
1033	(6) If an error in assignment of a Consent Calendar item is discovered and					
1034	reported by the legislative chair to the Coordinator of the Calendar, the					
1035	Coordinator of the Calendar shall have the authority to report the error to the					
1036	plenary session for reconsideration.					
1037	(7) Any 20 delegates may have a Consent Calendar item removed by having					
1038	such a request on file with the Secretary of the General Conference by 3:00					
1039	P.M. of the day the calendar item first appears in the <i>Daily Christian Advocate</i> .					
1040	Reserve delegates may sign requests to remove item from the Consent Calendar					
1041	only while seated as voting delegates. Such items shall be called up in the					
1042	regular order of business.					
1043	(8) Items lifted from the Consent Calendar may not be returned to the Consent					
1044	Calendar.					

1045	Rule 34. Report of Non-Calendar Items
1046	(1) In addition to calendar items to be presented to the plenary, each
1047	legislative committee shall report all items not presented in the following
1048	categories: ⁴
1049	(a) Petitions not supported because another petition dealing with the
1050	same subject was acted upon.
1051	(b) Petitions not supported by the legislative committee. The committee
1052	shall report the vote of the committee.
1053	(2) These reports shall be in the <i>Daily Christian Advocate</i> .
1054	(3) Any 20 delegates may have an item in (1)(b) above presented to the
1055	plenary by having such a request on file with the Secretary of the General
1056	Conference by 3:00 P.M. of the day the item first appears in the Daily
1057	Christian Advocate. Reserve delegates may sign requests to present an item
1058	in (1)(b) above only while seated as voting delegates. Such items shall be
1059	called up in the regular order of business while the chair of the relevant
1060	committee is on the platform. Those supporting consideration of said items
1061	shall select one of their number to present the item to the plenary.
1062	Rule 35. Rules of Order of Legislative Committees
1063	The rules of order of the General Conference, except for Rule 7, shall be
1064	observed in meetings of standing legislative committees insofar as they apply.
1065	Rule 36. Duties and Prerogatives of Legislative Committees
1066	(1) Following orientation of officers, committee leadership, utilizing the
1067	resources of its petitions coordinator, shall evaluate the petitions assigned to the
1068	committee, establish priorities, and outline the committee's work on the basis of
1069	those priorities unless it is given special instructions by the General Conference
1070	(See Section VII.A.(7)(a)).

1082	by the Conference, directly or through the Committee on Reference. Committee
1083	reports on resolutions, petitions, etc., shall cite the same, identifying them by
1084	numbers they bear respectively in the published reports of the Committee on
1085	Reference or in some other suitable manner.
1086	(5) When a committee ascertains that another committee is, or in its judgment
1087	should be, considering a subject that the former is considering, it shall report the
1088	matter to the Committee on Reference for such adjustment as the situation may
1089	require.
1090	(6) The chairperson of each legislative committee shall coordinate the report of
1091	the committee to the plenary.

1092	(7) When the chairperson of a committee is not in agreement with a report
1093	adopted by the committee, it shall be the chairperson's duty to state the fact to
1094	the committee. The committee shall elect one of its members for the
1095	presentation and discussion of the report in the plenary. If, in such a case, the
1096	committee shall fail to select a representative, the chairperson shall designate a
1097	member to represent the committee, and said representative shall have all the
1098	rights and privileges of the chairperson in relation to such a report.

1100	Rule 3/. Legislative Committee Report to the Daily Christian Advocate
1101	(1) As quickly as material can be prepared, each secretary of a legislative
1102	committee shall present each of the committee's reports to a recorder assigned
1103	to the committee. The recorder will prepare the report and the report will be
1104	approved and signed by the chair, vice-chair and secretary. After the report has
1105	been approved, it will be electronically transmitted to the Coordinator of the
1106	Calendar. A calendar number will be assigned and it will be published as
1107	approved.
1108	(2) Committee and minority reports that propose changes in the <i>Book of</i>
1109	Discipline shall give the paragraph number to be affected and shall be prepared
1110	in the following manner: Existing words used as reference points shall be in
1111	quotation marks; words to be deleted shall be in strike through; words to be
1112	added shall be bolded. In the publication of these reports, the Daily Christian
1113	Advocate will use the same convention (See Rule 40).
1114	Rule 38. Published Reports in Possession of Conference
1115	Reports submitted by the committee according to the deadline, as announced by
1116	the Secretary of the General Conference, shall appear in the next day's Daily
1117	Christian Advocate. The report as published in the Daily Christian Advocate is
1118	the official copy, subject only to grammatical or other obvious editorial changes
1119	and shall be regarded as in the possession of the Conference. On the day
1120	following its first appearance in the Daily Christian Advocate or any time
1121	thereafter, a report is in order for consideration at the pleasure of the conference.
1122	The same rule shall apply to a minority report from any committee (See Rules
1123	22, 29).
1124	Rule 39. Preparation and Publishing of Reports
1125	(1) All committee reports shall be prepared using the General Conference
1126	Legislative System approved by the Commission on the General Conference.
1127	(2) The report to the Coordinator of the Calendar for items voted in committee
1128	shall include the name of the committee, its total membership, the number
1129	present at the time the item was adopted, and the number voting for and against

1137	VI. Suspending, Amending, and Supplementing
1138	Rule 40. Suspension of the Rules
1139	The operation of any of the provisions of the Plan of Organization and Rules of
1140	Order may be suspended at any time by a two-thirds vote of the Conference
1141	(See Rule 31.6).
1142	Rule 41. Amending Rules
1143	The Plan of Organization and Rules of Order may be amended or changed by a
1144	two-thirds vote of the Conference; provided the proposed change or amendment
1145	has originated in the Committee on Plan of Organization and Rules of Order or
1146	has been presented to the Conference in writing and referred to this committee,
1147	which committee shall report thereon not later than the following day (See Rule
1148	31.6).
1149	The Plan of Organization and Rules of Order as adopted at the opening session
1150	shall be published in the next Daily Christian Advocate.
1151	Rule 42. Robert's Rules of Order, Supplemental Authority
1152	In any parliamentary situation not covered by the Plan of Organization and
1153	Rules of Order, the General Conference shall be governed in its action by the
1154	current edition of Robert's Rules of Order.

Rule 33. Consent Calendar

Calendar items are automatically placed on a consent calendar when the item has ten (10) or fewer votes against the prevailing position of the legislative committee. Rule 33(3)(a)

The are three different consent calendars:

- Consent Calendar A contains calendar items involving *disciplinary* changes for which the legislative committee recommendation is to *adopt*
- Consent Calendar B contains calendar items involving non-disciplinary changes for which the legislative committee recommendation is to adopt
- Consent Calendar C contains any calendar item for which the committee recommendation is to refer.

Calendar items with a minority report *cannot* be placed on any consent calendar. Items with financial implications or items dealing with the Constitution cannot be placed on Consent Calendars A or B, but they *can* be placed on Consent Calendar C because there would be no financial or constitutional implications.

Rule 33(7) Removing a Calendar Item from the Consent Calendar

Any twenty (20) delegates may have a Consent Calendar item removed by submitting a Consent Calendar Removal Request Form by 3:00 p.m. of the day the calendar item first appears in the *Daily Christian Advocate*. The form can be picked up from room 104 and returned to room 104. Reserve delegates may sign requests to remove items from the consent calendar onlu while seated as voting delegates.
